## TASK A:

### 1 Train Station

(Ding Dong) Attention, please! Due to remodelling being done in Euston station, the ticket office has been moved to temporary quarters. It is located in the main hall next to the bakery until the end of October.

(Ding Dong) There are some changes in platforms because of repair work this week. All trains to Manchester will depart from platform 8, all trains to Glasgow will be leaving from platform nine and all trains to Edinburgh set off from platform 11.

(Ding Dong) There is a time change on the Intercity train from Leeds. Due to severe weather conditions the train is delayed by one hour. The train from Leeds will arrive at 14.30, not 13.30, on platform six.

(Ding Dong) Would Mr Charles Miller from Edinburgh please go to the tourist information office. That's Mr. Miller, please go to the tourist office near the entrance for an emergency message.

### 2 Seminar

Hi, John. This is Sue here. Look, I just got the information for the seminar on the 3rd April. Have you got a pen and paper at hand? Here goes. It starts at 9am with coffee and croissants before the main speaker at 9:45. Lunch is at 12:15. In the afternoon there are three workshops you can choose from. ## TASK B:

- A Good morning, Ryan, have you got a minute? I'd like to ask you a couple of things about the quality of water in our city.
- R Hello, Alice. Sure. What do you need to know?
- A First off, who is responsible for keeping the water clean, so we can drink it?
- R That's the city's department of natural resources. Of course, they have to follow rules set up by the state and federal governments. There is a new agreement being discussed right now. If the state signs it, then the city will have more control over which chemicals get used in our area. We'd like that.
- A Do we get any financial help from the governments?
- R Yes, some. They give a little support, because by keeping the streams and waterways clean in the cities, the national water system is also kept clean. That means the rivers and lakes continue to be healthy for fish to live in and for people to swim in.
- A Secondly, I'd like to know who is responsible for the maintenance of the machines at the water works.
- R That's the city, too. We hire and pay the five full-time employees at the water works. There is a secretary in the office, two chemists for the quality of the water and two maintenance men who repair the machines and make sure they work efficiently.
- A How long ago was the equipment at our water works modernized?
- R Unfortunately, that was over 30 years ago. The city council has been increasing the budget for the water works during the past three years in order to save money to invest in new modern machines.
- A Is changing to an energy that is better for the environment part of their modernization plans?
- R It definitely is. They have been discussing whether to change to solar energy, wind or ethanol, just like everyone else when it comes to homes and cars. Each one has its advantages and disadvantages.
- A Thanks, Ryan. By the way, can I quote you on this in my next column in tomorrow's daily paper?
- R Yes, of course you can, but I'd like to read it before it goes to press.
